

Inspection Readiness Focus

Treaty verification activities challenge even the most robust traditional security programs. Inspection readiness is essential. The DTIRP Outreach Program has an inspection readiness focus to assist sites with their preparation. When properly prepared, U.S. facilities can both demonstrate treaty compliance and protect national security, proprietary, or other critical information.

As part of the defense community—site, facility program managers, and security officers use the DTIRP's practical, customer-oriented information to enhance treaty knowledge and determine susceptibility to verification activities. Impacted sites not only learn about U.S. treaty obligations, inspector rights, and facility rights and obligations, but also share valuable lessons learned. Such information is central to inspection readiness planning and preparation.

Furthermore, DTIRP personnel stand ready to assist in a variety of ways. They are experienced in treaty issues of direct concern to U.S. facilities, and have the experience in applying security countermeasures in the treaty inspection environment. Should a DoD facility be subject to any arms control treaty or agreement inspection, the DTIRP can deploy treaty and security experts on short-notice to assist, when requested.

What is DTIRP

The Defense Treaty Inspection Readiness Program (DTIRP) is a U.S. Department of Defense (DoD) security education and awareness outreach program designed to assist the arms control community. Through the use of specially-trained personnel, analyses, and educational activities, the DTIRP provides arms control advice and assistance to sites and facilities susceptible to on-site inspections and overflights required through various arms control treaties and agreements. The program utilizes expertise from the DoD and other U.S. Government agencies to achieve maximum efficiency and economy.

Outreach Awareness Program

Recognizing that information is a powerful security countermeasure, the DTIRP develops and distributes a variety of arms control security education and awareness outreach materials to sites and facilities impacted—or potentially impacted—by arms control treaties and agreements. The materials, based upon both customer needs and arms control community interests, include print and multimedia products on arms control issues affecting the government and defense industry community.

The DTIRP Outreach Program delivers complementary support customized to meet the unique security needs of each facility affected by arms control activities. It leverages the wide-ranging experience and expertise of the U.S. arms control security community to provide focused security assistance in accordance with current U.S. implementation policy and legislation. Through tailored presentations, briefings, and regional seminars, DTIRP personnel explain the potential impact of various arms control agreements on U.S. facilities. Regional seminars, of one- or two-day duration, focus on fulfilling a specific site need or request for information. Such requests can focus on a single agreement, such as Chemical Weapons Convention challenge inspection issues or Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty special right of access visit procedures, or issues with a multi-treaty focus.

As requested and appropriate, the DTIRP also prepares treaty security assistance packages, such as the Chemical Technology Security Course, which includes site preparation, tabletop exercises, and mock inspections.

Under a growing number of arms control treaties and agreements, the United States has agreed to grant foreign inspection teams an unprecedented level of access to U.S. sites and facilities associated with treaty-related activities. Traditional security measures, such as gates and fences, are designed to keep threats outside of sensitive and proprietary areas. During intrusive arms control inspections, where foreign inspectors are invited to inspect a facility to assess U.S. compliance with its treaty obligations, a different security approach is needed. Not only must treaty compliance be demonstrated, but national security, proprietary and other critical information must be protected.

As a community effort, the DTIRP is able to combine and focus the multidisciplinary intelligence, counterintelligence, and security countermeasures expertise of the government with treaty inspection experience. The program enjoys formal support from all major government organizations concerned with arms control security. The result is practical, customer-oriented information and support to site, facility, and program managers and security officers who must protect their critical assets.

The DTIRP outreach materials help impacted site personnel do their part to demonstrate U.S. treaty compliance, while simultaneously meeting their obligations to protect critical information from disclosure. The combination of the DTIRP's treaty inspection and security countermeasure expertise ensures the materials are always current, accurate, and timely.

The DTIRP Outreach Program produces and provides education and awareness materials and presents treaty inspection readiness awareness events on topics such as:

- ♦ Challenge inspections under the Chemical Weapons Convention;
- ♦ Visits with special right of access under the Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty;
- ♦ Facility overflights under the Treaty on Open Skies;
- ♦ Potential facility security impacts of the U.S.-IAEA Safeguards Agreement and emerging nuclear-related agreements; and
- ♦ Other timely arms control topics.
